# Goodwill

In 1949, Diplomats of the two governments signed an agreement in Tehran, Iran, to establish the United States Commission for Cultural Exchange between Iran and the United States. Its purpose was to promote a "wider exchange of knowledge and professional talents through educational contacts," and within 30 years, Iranians outnumbered the second-largest group of international students in the United States by almost three-to-one.
